

Minutes of the March 23rd, 2015 Executive Council Meeting

The Executive Council convened for a springtime dinner meeting at the Capital Grille in Chestnut Hill on March 23rd, 2015. Attending were members Briggs, Mackey, Rubin, Callery, Millham, Watkins, Brooks, Nauta and Executive Director Kristen Boyer. Before dinner, President Briggs thanked Ms. Boyer for her continued outstanding work and welcomed Council to a working meal amidst the relaxed setting. Her energy and motivation would indeed set the pace for a very productive meeting.

The meeting commenced with a review and approval of minutes from meetings of the 2014-2015 season recently ended. Dr. Briggs next guided our discussion as to new initiatives and opportunities for the upcoming 2015-2016 schedule. Council vigorously debated the puzzle of costs, merits and limitations of the Society's various meeting venues over the past several years. Again, it was decided that five meetings should again be held with one being the December Annual Meeting at the Harvard Club on Commonwealth Avenue in Boston. It was discussed and decided that, for the upcoming season, another two meetings would be held at the Harvard Club, and two at venues to be arranged. The guiding objective was to increase resident attendance which has been waning. The first Monday of the month would hold, as would meeting fees.

Treasurer Frederick Millham next provided a concise report of the continued gradual improvement of the Society's finances. Current available liquid assets total \$79,385. Year-to-date revenues soundly exceed expenses. Dr. Millham emphasized that our greatest financial risk remains delinquent dues, especially from active members. He asked Council members to reach out to any known members in arrears. After a hearty debate, Council voted on and approved an increase in annual dues to \$250. This was felt to be fiscally sensible, timely and equitable for the Society and its members.

The Council next returned to discussion of potential topics for meetings in the year ahead. Various Council members volunteered to assist President Briggs in reaching out, inviting and confirming select dates for proposed speakers. Topics and new meeting formats thought potentially to enhance and encourage resident attendance took priority.

A wide-ranging discussion of novel Society initiatives followed over coffee. Some topics included potential creation of a Membership Committee to task and structure recruitment, ideas for increasing revenue for the Society, and requests to academic training programs to subsidize residents attending meetings. The acceptance of non-boarded candidates also would be put to a vote. New mechanisms to acknowledge unique and meritorious service to the Society were considered.

With no further new business requiring consideration, President Briggs thanked the Council and adjourned the meeting by 8:45 PM.

The 100th Annual Meeting of the Boston Surgical Society was held on Monday December 14th, 2015 at the Harvard Club on Commonwealth Avenue. After a vibrant and crowded cocktail reception, President Susan Miller Briggs brought the meeting to order with 120 members and guests present in the Club’s Main Hall. Even more guests would arrive as the evening advanced.

Following Dr. Brigg’s welcome and Presidential report, Dr. Callery presented the Secretary’s report indicating the current Society active membership of nearly 500 and a roster of 30 nominees for new membership this year. Increasing meeting attendance was also noted. No tellers were chosen, instead President Briggs asked members to review all candidates and consider electing the ballot by proclamation. All were duly elected and rose to receive their certificates.

Next, Dr. Frederick Millham presented the Treasurer’s Report in most encouraging terms. He detailed liquid assets exceeding \$70,000 against negligible debt and clarified measures to control expenses. After applause, Dr. Millham quite clearly summarized the importance and impact of timely dues payment. He indicated the new adjustment of dues to \$250 annually, but also noted no changes to meeting admission fees. He encouraged all to pay online early and to bring residents to every meeting.

Dr. David Schoetz next presented the 2016 slate of nominees on behalf of the Nominating Committee: for President-elect Pardon S. Kenney, Vice-President John Schuler, Secretary David McAneny, Treasurer Frederick Millham, Dinner Chairman Richard Ehrlichman, and Councilor Gerard Doherty. Once confirmed that there were indeed no nominees from the floor, this slate was enthusiastically moved forward and approved by voice vote.
